David Lodge	<ul> <li>According to David Lodge in his book; Language of Fiction:         Essays in Criticism and Verbal Analysis of the English         Novel(1966),</li> <li>He says that " we assess a novelist according to the success with which he constructs in fictional world in which every action or utterance contributes to our understanding of any other.</li> </ul>
Henry James	<ul> <li>Henry James had a unique perception of the novel: " A novel is a living thing, all one and continuous, like any other organism, and in proportion as it lives it will be found, I think that in each of the parts there is something of the other parts."</li> </ul>
Some critics	<ul> <li>Some critics go further than that, they think that the work of the novelist is creative not descriptive. The novelist should create his novel from his mind and imagination</li> </ul>
Austin Wright	According to Austin Wright, "A novel is a kind of communication. It acts as a bridge between the novelist and audience
E.M. Forster	E.M. Forster sees novel as a kind of art that" imitates or represents images of life, real or imagined, abstract or concrete, ranging from the most specific and individualized to the most universal and archetypal"(Wright, 1982)
Aphra Behn	<ul> <li>Some critics consider <u>Aphra Behn</u> the first novelist and she made a living from publishing novels. She wrote <i>Oronooko</i> in 1688 and borrowed a lot from the French romances.</li> </ul>
<u>Daniel</u> <u>Defoe</u>	But <u>Daniel Defoe</u> is credited with the appearance of the "true" English novel by the publication of Robinson Crusoe in 1719.
	<ul> <li>A novel is a kind of art, good artistic experience. It is written for "artistic sake", to show how it is well made.</li> </ul>
